

At Montana International School Uganda, we start from Key Stage 3 (Years 7, 8, and 9) up to the Sixth Form (Key Stage 5) with Years 12 and 13.

#### **KEY STAGE 3- YEARS 7,8 & 9**

In the first years of secondary school, Key Stage 3 is a very important time in the academic and personal growth of young people.

At MISU, we offer a range of subjects to allow our students to explore their passions and develop their academic ability in lots of

disciplines before they choose their subjects in Key Stage 4.

The subjects that students study in Years 7, 8, and 9 are:

- English
- Mathematics
- Science (Biology, Chemistry, Physics-Combined)
- Global Perspective
- History
- Geography

- French
- Kiswahili
- Music
- Physical Education
- Information and

Communication Technology (ICT)

- Swimming
- Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE)

#### **KEY STAGE 4- YEARS 10 & 11**

Key Stage 4 students at MISU follow Cambridge IGCSE and O Level syllabi. These courses and associated final their examinations are internationally recognized as one of the best measures of academic progress for students aged 16+ years.

IGCSEs are two-year courses with examinations taken during May/June and October/ November of the second year, although for some subjects a coursework component exists.

The subjects we offer at IGCSE/ O Level are: Compulsory English Language Mathematics Coordinated Science (IGCSE)equivalent to 2 IGCSEs

- Kiswahili 1
- Arabic
- French
- Group 2 (Humanities and Social Sciences)
- Business Studies
- Economics
- Geography
- Global Perspective
- History
- Sociology
- Group 3 (Creative, Technical and Vocational)

- Information and C o m m u n i c a t i o n Technology (ICT)
- Physical Education (P.E)

All KS 4 students will also have 3 periods of Physical Education (Games andFitness, swimming), and 1 Period of Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) per week.

#### SIXTH FORM (KS5)

All students in the 6th Form participate in the Cambridge International Examinations AS and A Level qualifications.

Key Stage 5- Sixth Form, students take a selection of Cambridge A Level courses, in addition to other school-run projects and programs.

#### **Course Structure**

In Year 12, students choose 4 subjects at AS level. In Year 13. Students can then opt to drop one subject and take the remaining three subjects to the A2 level. Ultimately, students should achieve three A levels and one AS. Each subject is allocated 5 hours of instruction a week in six 50-minute periods.

AS/A-level courses are available in a broad range of disciplines. The subjects offered are carefully considered to reflect the changing views and requirements from universities, and so ensure students have a breadth of study at this level.

However, the courses are also subject to availability, based on the number of students choosing them.

Subjects offered at MISU are:

- Accounting
- Art & Design
- Biology
- Business Studies
- Chemistry
- Computer Science
- Economics
- English Literature
- Geography
- Global Perspective
- History
- Mathematics
- Physical Education
- Physics

All 6th Form students are expected to take part in one double P.E lesson per week.

During these sessions, students can pick a range of sports to take part in, including swimming, football, basketball, badminton, and tennis.

#### **PASTORAL SUPPORT**

All our students work with Sixth Form tutor for their pastoral support. Through their tutor program, they examine issues such as substance abuse, mental health awareness, target setting, and thinking skills.

They also begin preparations for moving away from home by learning about budgeting and the importance of a healthy diet.

The allocated time for the tutor is also used to support students in the university application process, such as choosing an institution and writing a personal statement. Thank you very much for your time.

Pastoral care deals with the overall welfare and development of a student, and as such, is central to the achievement of our mission statement. Every student in the school must have an adult who

Weapons (guns, knives, catapults, etc.), including replicas.


- Drugs and drug-related items (unless medically prescribed)
